
Corporation Accountability Action plan on Skills

Key employability skills have been identified by international research and local employers as essential for the workplace and for progression within and from it. Understanding what aspects of our curriculum have been most/least useful to students when they leave is crucial to being able to make further improvements.

6	Strongly position the College within the local and regional skills infrastructure through maintenance and development of strategic partnerships:	 Establish productive working relationships within the LSIP with other Gloucestershire Colleges and with Wiltshire College. Explore a new relationship with RAU Maintain existing ERB relationships in Gloucestershire, Swindon & Wiltshire (including SWIOT) and Oxfordshire. 	Contribute to ensuring a coherent regional offer that meets local employer need and provides access for students across the whole area.	
7	Improve awareness of skills opportunities amongst 14-16 pupils	 Enhance our careers/ guidance offer to local 'feeder' schools. Use our new skills facilities to raise aspirations amongst young people. 	National 'Gatsby Benchmarks' for careers education are not yet being met by many schools and we can particularly help with regard to technical skills.	

We would like to develop target 1 above with more essential skills for adults which are a national skills priority (see point 23 in DfE Guidance April 2023). However, this depends on an increased adult funding allocation, which is not guaranteed.
