Some context

- Around 40% of young people now go to university
- Universities are looking at more and more applicants who look increasingly similar.
- In order to get a place, candidates can't just think in terms of meeting the entry criteria: that just puts them in the race, it doesn't mean they'll win a place.



What is a selective university & which universities are we talking about?

Russell Group

Traditionally the 24 'top' most competitive universities to get into – includes the likes of Oxford, Cambridge, Bristol and Imperial

Sutton Trust top 30 Selective Universities

Includes Russell Group plus the likes of Bath, Royal Holloway, Surrey

Top third or Times list

Includes the above plus the likes of Sussex, Aston, Kent



Advantages

- Outstanding reputation for teaching, research and learning nationally and internationally
- Teaching based on small groups and tutorials at Oxbridge
- Employment prospects
- Excellent facilities
- College system



Disadvantages

- Capricious nature of selection process
- Traditional and at times narrow/unsuitable choice of courses
- Pressure of learning with the elite
- Greater assessment by examination



Different Application Process for Oxbridge

- Deadline earlier 15 October
- You apply to a College, although open applications are possible
- Pre-admissions tests
- Interviews for all courses in December
- Offers are made early January

- Powerful performance at interview
- Academic and intellectual potential
- Check College and Faculty prospectuses for additional criteria



Super-curricular

- Read extra books or articles
- Attend summer schools or lectures
 - Complete extra projects
- Subject or career focused work experience

Extra-curricular

- Hobbies
- Part time jobs
- Duke of Edinburgh Award
 - Volunteering



Choices

- University websites often have guidance on the types of subjects they like to see.
- Get your information 'from the horse's mouth'!
- If you are thinking about a specific course then check its entry requirements.
 - If you want to do Medicine you need to be taking Biology and Chemistry
 - Some Economics and Psychology courses require Maths
 - If you're not so certain on what degree then try to have at least two "facilitating subjects" - "Russell Group Informed Choices"



Russell Group

- You apply through UCAS
- Early application is advised
- Offers are usually high
- Some courses/universities interview
- Check teaching grades
- Are they offering the best fit of course for you?



What do you need from a Post 16 provider?

- A focused Oxbridge/Russell support programme
- Oxbridge tutors who can give individual and informed advice
- A centre who have a good relationship with a number of these universities
- Knowing what Admissions Tutors want



What do you need from a Post 16 provider?

- A really well organized HE programme
- Dedicated trips, speakers and mock interviews
- Well written references and quality guidance with the personal statements
- Contact with existing Oxbridge/Russell Group students
